News You Can Use: The Power of Prior Written Notice (PWN)

Just about every day STEP receives a call from a parent asking questions like, "Can the school say no to my request for an evaluation?", or "What do I do next? The school is suggesting changing my child's placement." The division of special education issued guidance to clarify the use of prior written notice, a powerful tool to use when these types of questions arise. The June 8, 2017 memo from Assistant Commissioner for Special Populations, Theresa Nicholls, addresses these four instances that require prior written notice: IEP Team Proposal; IEP Team Refusal; Initial Evaluation; and Re-evaluation.

The memo states: The term "prior written notice" refers to <u>written</u> notice that is required after a change has been proposed or refused but before (i.e., prior to) implementing that change. In other words, as a parent, you must be given, in writing, specific information by your child's school system that will help you understand what is being proposed or refused and why. This is a vital component you can use to determine what steps to take next.




Hearing the Families' Voice - Parent Concerns as a Priority (in our archives)

Our STEP team members continue to offer workshops, training, and support on a variety of topics related to effective family engagement and how to successfully navigate special education. Through our efforts on the State Personnel Development Grant (SPDG), we are working with a school in Wilson County and a school in Loudon County to blend unique family engagement strategies and activities with their existing work with families.

Karen Harrison presented a session at the 2020 Partners In Education conference on Thursday, January 30, "Remodeling Family Engagement: How to Engage Families by Improving Existing Activities." She offered strategies districts can use to maximize the effectiveness of their current work with parents and families, including quick selfassessments, planning grids to expand current touchpoints into more effective learning and relationship building opportunities, innovative strategies to gather data on family needs, and much more.
