A PASSION FOR POLICY & PEOPLE: INTERN SPOTLIGHT ON ELENA

We're excited to spotlight **Elena, our Government and Community Affairs Intern** from Vanderbilt's Peabody College. From day one, she jumped into TNSTEP's mission, advocating for families and supporting meaningful change in the special education community.

"What first drew me to TNSTEP," Elena shared, *"was the organization's dedication to walking alongside families for the long haul. TNSTEP doesn't just talk about advocacy—it lives it every day."* She was surprised to learn that our small but mighty team supports families across all 95 counties, serving children and youth with any disability from birth through age 26.

A standout moment of her internship was meeting with lawmakers, where Elena saw firsthand the strategy and persistence behind policy work. She also attended a disability conference, hearing stories that reminded her that advocacy is about real people, empowerment, opportunity, and belonging.


SUPPORT TNSTEP'S MISSION

Strategic Partnerships and Community Engagement

Partnered with EdTrust and Senator McKenzie to host a youth-focused Zoom discussion, elevating youth voices and strengthening connections with state leadership.

Karen, Executive Director, represented TNSTEP at the **EdTrust Round Table**, contributing to meaningful training around education equity and policy impacting students with disabilities.



Program Enhancements and Achievements

Expanded TNSTEP's multimedia outreach through the creation of mission and awareness videos in Tennessee's top four languages, produced in partnership with the Tennessee Disability Coalition (TDC) to ensure accessibility for families statewide.



Launched a Family Engagement and Special Education video series as part of the TN-TAN network, providing families with clear, accessible information about navigating special education.

Advocacy and Leadership

Director of Middle TN Services, Patricia, participated in a national **Deaf-Blind initiative**, contributing to conversations and strategies that address educational access for children who are deaf-blind and their families.



Educational and Training Initiatives

Participated in MegaConference, connecting with educators, advocates, and partners to strengthen collaboration and share best practices.

Launched a quarterly Early Childhood Lunch and Learn webinar series in partnership with DDA-TEIS, providing training and resources for both families and educators.

Government Affairs and Policy Engagement

Advanced the work of TNSTEP's Government Affairs Committee, strengthening advocacy efforts and increasing engagement with policymakers to support students with disabilities and their families.


